Discuss the benefits of being a consumer of research.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Understanding research and the conclusions that can be drawn from different methodologies allows a person to think critically when confronted with research in the media, which is often reported inaccurately. It can also help a person as a consumer to make important decisions such as what to eat and to buy. Additionally, many careers require people to read different research reports, and it is therefore important to be able to identify good and flawed research to avoid making bad decisions.

Discuss why researchers use theories to explain behavior and other psychological phenomena.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Theories are a set of organized ideas that serve to explain a behavior. Researchers use theories to explain behavior because they can generate testable hypotheses that are used to understand why, and under what conditions, a behavior takes place. Additionally, theories can be modified when their predictions are shown to be false. In this way, theories drive research.

Q34. [Essay]

One of the goals of psychology is the ability to control behavior. How does psychological research support this goal?

Suggested answer: Sample response: The majority of psychological research is interested in determining how the average person is going to behave under a given set of circumstances. By examining the variables that cause a behavior, psychologists are able to predict how a person will react to a situation. They can use this knowledge to develop programs, therapies, and environments that elicit a desired attitude or behavior in people.

Discuss how descriptive research and experimental research can complement each other.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Descriptive and experimental research are able to complement each other because they have different advantages and disadvantages. Experimental research has high internal validity but low external validity; descriptive research has high external validity and low internal validity. Therefore, experimental research can isolate variables and determine cause and effect, while descriptive research can examine how these variables act in real life situations. Together, the two approaches can give a more comprehensive understanding of the behavior or phenomena in question.

Suggested answer: Sample response: It is important to follow the scientific method when conducting research because the rules and procedures provide a standardized process that helps to ensure that the research study is objective and free of bias. Q45. [Essay]

Parvati is studying how familiarity influences attraction. She defines “attraction” as physiological changes—such as heartrate, temperature, and pupil dilation—evoked by liking of someone. She defines “familiarity” as the recognizability of another person due to experience. Which goal of science has Parvati met? Why this is important?

Suggested answer: *Sample response: The scenario illustrates the description goal of science. The two behaviors, attraction and familiarity, are not observable. Therefore, Parvati must describe them in such a way as to make them concrete and measurable. In other words, researchers must describe what a specific behavior is in terms of what they are going to look for and in a way that is objective.*

Q46. [Essay]

Discuss how variables can be operationalized in different ways. Provide an example.

Suggested answer: *Sample response: Many variables can be studied in different ways therefore researchers are able to choose how they want to operationalize their variable of interest. For example, there are many ways we could operationalize “attraction.” It could be operationalized as physiological changes, amount of smiling and eye-contact, or in terms of physical proximity. The point of operationalizing a variable is to specify the meaning of the variable in terms of how it will be measured and studied.*

Q47. [Essay]

In March of 2020, the journal *Heart* reported on a study examining the link between bathing and cardiovascular disease. The study used a longitudinal design and followed participants for 20–years. At the beginning of the study, participants responded to a questionnaire regarding their health and lifestyle. At the end of the study, researchers found a correlation between hot baths and cardiovascular disease. The study revealed that people who bathed twice a week had a 28% lower risk of developing cardiovascular disease and a 26% lower risk of a stroke. The media reported on this study and stated that “taking hot baths can lower your risk of cardiovascular disease.” Discuss what is wrong with the statement made by the media regarding the study.

Suggested answer: *Sample response: The problem with the media’s statement is that it suggests that hot baths are cause of lower risk of cardiovascular disease, and the study does not support this claim. The study was a correlational rather than experimental, and although hot bathes and cardiovascular disease were correlated, this does not mean that they are causally related. In other words, it could be a completely separate, unmeasured variable that is driving the correlation.*

Q48. [Essay]

Kai wants is interested in finding out how students at his school view professors who have visible tattoos on their arms. What type of research design should Kai use? Why?

Suggested answer: *Sample response: Kai should use descriptive research because he is trying to describe phenomena rather than determine cause-and-effect. More specifically, he should use a survey method because surveys are a good way to assess a person’s attitudes and opinions about professors with tattoos.*
