Explain the difference between sociology and psychology.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Varies. Psychology is primarily concerned with what happens inside of us, while sociology is more about what happens between us. Psychology is the study of individual behavior and mental processes (e.g., sensation, perception, memory, and thought processes). It differs from sociology in that it focuses on individuals rather than on groups, institutions, and societies. Sociology focuses on group patterns. Rather than focus on why individuals behave in certain ways, sociologists focus on how people behave in groups, and the social patterns of group behavior. Sociologists also examine the causes of social problems, such as delinquency, child abuse, crime, poverty, and war, and ways they can be addressed.

Q56. [Essay]

Name at least three ideas underlying sociology and explain why each one is important in our understanding of human behavior.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Varies. There are five ideas underlying sociology listed in the textbook: (1) People are social by nature. This is important because we need to understand that individual behavior does not happen in a vacuum, it takes place within their social experiences and surroundings. (2) People live much of their lives belonging to social groups. This is important because we need to understand the interconnected nature of human existence, which cannot be separated from social existence. (3) Interaction between the individual and the group is a two-way process in which each influences the other. It is important to understand just how much impact groups have on us as individuals but also important to understand how much impact we have on groups we belong to. (4) Recurrent social patterns, ordered behavior, shared expectations, and common understandings among people characterize groups. It is important to recognize that groups do not just happen to exist, nor are they randomly tossed by invisible currents. Groups exist because humans create them, and it is our shared experiences and ideas that shape and guide those groups over time. (5) The processes of conflict and change are natural and inevitable features of groups and societies. It is important to realize that conflict is not inherently bad nor a sign of pathology within a group or a society. All groups and societies must change over time to survive and that change often involves conflict.

Briefly discuss what sociologists mean by “using the sociological imagination.” Provide a real-life example of its application.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Varies. Using the sociological imagination refers to understanding the relationship between individual experiences and public issues. There are many possible examples. One would be losing one’s job: most people assume job loss is caused by poor work performance, but when entire industries are moving their manufacturing overseas to save money on labor costs millions of Americans lose their jobs no matter how good they are as employees. Their unemployment is caused by social forces, not individual behavior.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Varies. There are several skills that can help us contribute to reducing or solving social problems. Sociology helps give us a more complete understanding of social situations by looking beyond individual explanations to include group analyses of behavior. It helps us understand and evaluate problems more clearly, viewing the world systematically and objectively rather than only in emotional or personal terms. Sociology gives us skills to assess the impact of social policies and learn how to change your local environment and the larger society. Any two of these skills are useful when examining and attempting to deal with social problems.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Varies. The sociological perspective helps us be more effective as we carry out our roles in life. For example, an employee who has studied sociology may better understand how to work as part of a group and how the structure of the workplace affects individual behavior, how to approach problem solving, and how to collect and analyze data. Likewise, a schoolteacher trained in sociology may have a better understanding of classroom management, student motivation, the causes of poor student learning that have roots outside the school, and why students drop out. Everyone benefits from understanding how our social world works.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Varies. The social world model helps us picture the levels of analysis in our social surroundings as an interconnected series of small groups, organizations, institutions, and societies. Understanding that our world operates at the micro-, meso-, and macro-level furthers our sense of how things happen and gives us a way of analyzing it at all of those levels.

Briefly describe how commonsense and sociological beliefs differ from one another and give an example of a commonsense belief that is contradicted by sociological findings.

Suggested answer: Sample response: *Varies. Commonsense beliefs are simply things that a lot of people believe to be true and consider “common knowledge” or “commonsense.” These beliefs are often not true at all. Sociological findings are based on empirical research evidence and are true if the research is done well and can be replicated. The textbook points out that commonsense beliefs about race and gender are incorrect in that they overemphasize biological factors and ignore social factors. Race is a social construction, not a biological fact.*

Define social institutions and provide at least two examples of each.

Suggested answer: Sample response: *Varies. Social institutions are organized, patterned, and enduring sets of social structures that provide guidelines for behavior and help each society meet its basic survival needs. Examples of social institutions include family, education, religion, politics, health care, and economics. All societies have those social institutions. In more complex societies, there are also essential structures that provide science, media, advanced health care, and a military.*

Define social processes and provide at least two examples.

Suggested answer: Sample response: *Varies. Social processes are the actual behaviors that occur within social structures. They take place through actions of people in institutions and other social units. Examples vary. The process of socialization teaches individuals how to behave in their society. It takes place through actions in families, educational systems, religious organizations, and other social units. Socialization is essential for the continuation of any society because, through this process, members of society learn the thoughts and actions needed to survive in their society. The process of social change also occurs through a series of interconnected actions by individuals within social structures and institutions.*

Explain the three levels of analysis in the social world discussed in the text and give an example of each.

Suggested answer: Sample response: *Varies. The three levels of analysis are micro-level, meso-level, and macro-level. Micro-level analysis involves studying what goes on between individuals and small groups of people. Studying the process new roommates go through would be a micro-level sociological analysis. Meso-level analysis refers to studying involves intermediate-sized units smaller than the nation but larger than the local community. Examples include studying national organizations like the NRA or political parties, ethnic groups within the United States, or religious groups like Evangelical Christians or Muslims in the U.S. Macro-level analysis involves looking at entire nations, global forces (such as international organizations), and international social trends. Examples would be studying national politics, the economy of a nation, or an international war.*

Explain how a presidential election can affect human relationships on the micro, meso, and macro levels.

Suggested answer: Sample response: *Varies. A contentious election can lead to conflict, anger, and misunderstanding between friends or family members at the micro level. If different organizations choose sides and publicly endorse a candidate that can lead to alliances with other organizations who support the same candidate and conflict or severed ties with organizations that oppose that candidate. The winning candidate gains the right to place their own people into positions of authority throughout the federal government, which alters the course of events within the entire society going forward—the decisions made and policies put forth by those authorities shape the entire society.*

Imagine that you want to study child poverty from a micro, meso, and macro level. For each of the three levels of analysis, describe what question or questions you might ask to learn more about child poverty and why that level of analysis is appropriate for your question.

Suggested answer: *Sample response: Varies. A micro-level study of child poverty might look at the effects of poverty on specific groups of children, or what individual factors place a parent into the position of raising their children in poverty. A meso-level analysis might focus on the impact of institutional policies within school districts, state governments, or federal agencies either in terms of how those policies impact child poverty or their effectiveness at alleviating it. A macro-level study of child poverty might compare and contrast several countries to help determine what factors increase or decrease child poverty and/or what national policies alleviate or aggravate child poverty.*

Explain how social units and social institutions are related to the social structure. Using examples from your own life, illustrate the interconnectedness of these concepts.

Suggested answer: *Sample response: Varies. Social units are interconnected parts of the social world, ranging from small groups to societies. Social institutions are organized, patterned, and enduring sets of social structures that provide guidelines for behavior and help each society meet its basic survival needs. The social structure is the stable patterns of interactions, statuses (positions), roles (responsibilities), and organizations that provide stability for the society and bring order to individuals' lives. Social institutions include things like the family, the education system, the military, and so on. Social units include all of those plus smaller units (sports teams, groups of friends, individual families, etc.) and larger ones, up to and including the United States. All of those units, including the institutions, make up the social structure of our society.*
