Q122. [Essay]

Psychology did not become an official, separate science until the late 1800s. Why do you think it took so long for psychology to become its own discipline, compared to older sciences like physics and chemistry?

Suggested answer: Sample response: One of my teachers once said: "It's like a fish discovering water." I think it took so long for psychology to become an official science because we're so immersed in our own mental processes, like a fish in water. It took many centuries to realize that these mental processes could be taken as an object of scientific study, and even then, psychologists had to figure out how to study processes that are largely internal, and not directly observable from the outside.

Q123. [Essay]

The chapter suggests that psychology is a particularly difficult science because (1) many concepts, such as bias or memory, are difficult to measure directly; and (2) ethics are crucial. Choose one of these considerations and explain why it may be more difficult in psychology than other sciences.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Ethics are crucial in psychology because most of the research must be done on living beings. Compared to other sciences like physics or chemistry, in which many research questions may be pursued by studying inanimate objects or substances, using humans and other animals as research subjects requires a much higher bar for considering what type of studies can be done. In relatively recent history, famous studies like the Milgram study put people in manipulated experimental situations which could potentially have a negative effect on their psychological well-being. Since humans can be shaped in unpredictable ways by the situations they're in, it is crucial not to put human or animal subjects at undue risk of harm, even when the results might bring us greater knowledge.

Q124. [Essay]

Consider the 5 pillars of the APA's introductory psychology initiative, representing five major subfields of psychology: biological, cognitive, development, social and personality, and mental and physical health. Which subfield is most interesting to you, and why? Name at least one question within that area of study that you're curious to learn more about.

Suggested answer: Sample response: At this time in my life, I am most interested in biological psychology. I'm curious to learn more about the research on how body and mind influence each other, because I observe in my own life how much physical factors (like having a headache) influence my mood and thought processes. One question I'd like to know more about is how the brain and digestive system communicate and interact with each other.

Q125. [Essay]

Define introspection. Consider current methods, such as surveys, which still rely on participants' introspective reports. What is one advantage and one disadvantage of using introspection in psychology?

Suggested answer: Sample response: Introspection is self-observation of internal processes. While the drawbacks of using introspection in science are well-known, there is some information that simply can't be obtained in any other way. To this point, an advantage of introspection is that it attempts to get at this subjective information that is only accessible by the individual. While there may be some external indicators of mood, like facial expression or body language, the only way to really know how someone is feeling is to ask them. But even then there is no way to verify that what the person reports is what they're actually experiencing (a disadvantage of introspection).

Suggested answer: Sample response: I was interested in the work of Mamie Phipps Clark. The methods of her doll studies were clever, and the finding of internalized racism was striking and sad. I was particularly impressed that this work was cited in the Brown v. Board of Education decision that declared segregation in schools unconstitutional. While this decision did not immediately end segregation, it is a striking example of how psychological research can influence public policy. It left me curious how frequently psychological research is cited in Supreme Court decisions, and to what ends.

Q144. [Essay]

Read through the seven integrative themes of the introductory psychology initiative. Which theme especially stands out to you and why? Give an example of that theme, either from the chapter or your own life.

Suggested answer: Sample response: The theme that stands out to me most is, "Psychological science explains general principles that govern behavior while recognizing individual differences." This seems to be at the heart of what it means to study psychology. Every individual is unique; yet there are clearly mental and behavioral tendencies that we see expressed similarly across many different individuals (such as a cluster of symptoms that's been labelled as a certain disorder). One example from my own life is the personality trait of introversion. It's been a relief to learn, both through research studies and social media memes, that many other people experience the love of alone time and desire to avoid small talk that I used to think was something uniquely 'wrong' with me. The introversion/extroversion spectrum can be seen as a general principle, which is expressed in a unique way in my own life.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Regardless of what people think of his specific theories, Freud is a pioneer of psychotherapy. This fact piqued my interest. I also disagree with a lot of his specific ideas (like most of the details, and certainly the sexual bases of the psychosexual stages), but in a general sense he contributed important ideas about the unconscious, childhood influences on adulthood, and the potential of talk therapy. Discussion Topics

To the Instructor: These discussion topics are designed to engage students in conversation about the content of the current chapter. The discussions may take place in a classroom or on the online platform of the course. The scenario is designed to offer structure to the discussion, so that students may focus on their understanding of the links between the major topics in the chapter. Students are encouraged to engage and share anything they think may be important, even if it may need to be corrected for accuracy. In the classroom, you may wish to divide students into breakout groups and let them discuss the topic before bringing them all together into a discussion as a larger group. Alternatively, you may assign the discussion activity before class, so that students come to class prepared to discuss. On the online platform, students should comment on the main thread and reply to at least two other posts. Should you decide to make this part of the grade, a simple and flexible grading rubric has been provided for you, and half points are possible to assign where you see fit.

Discussion Activity

The following is a discussion topic for you to consider after studying the current chapter. The purpose of this discussion is for you to share your ideas about methods in psychology. The discussion activity is designed for interaction between you and your classmates so you may help each other better understand the chapter. In this activity, it is important for you to engage with your classmates' ideas. Sharing your ideas is encouraged, even if you are not so sure about the accuracy of the content. Indeed, the conversation should help you tune into the subject matter that you may need to go over again. In your discussion, you may also pose

- 1) Prepare a job ad that might be typical for your school inviting applications for the position of psychology instructor. Have students pair up.
 - 2) Provide students a list of prominent psychologists from the current chapter and have each pair of students choose one of the psychologists.
 - 3) Ask each pair to prepare an application packet as if they were the psychologist whom they have chosen (or that you have assigned them). The application should include a brief résumé, including important publications and experience, a statement of research philosophy or expertise, and a statement of teaching philosophy.

3. Lastly, discuss with students how the application materials and hiring choices might have differed if the prominent psychologists had been members of diverse groups. Why is it important that diverse voices are represented in the field?

Arts and Crafts Activity

Instructions: Make a map of the history of psychology. Your map should look like a series of Venn diagrams. Consult the chapter to note the various movements that comprise the history of psychology, including structuralism, functionalism, the biological approach, the psychodynamic approach, the behaviorist approach, the sociocultural approach, the humanistic approach, and the cognitive approach. As you consider your diagram, make a circle for each of these approaches. Allow your circles to overlap between approaches to show how they are similar – and label these similarities. Where approaches have unique attributes, those should be labeled too in the parts of the circles that do not overlap with other circles. When you are finished, be prepared to share your map with other members of the class and/or your instructor and discuss why you drew and labeled it as you did.

Concept Highlights

Starting Your Psychology Journey

Psychology is the scientific study of mental processes and behaviors. The American Psychological Association (APA) is the leading professional organization that governs psychology within North America. The APA has recently developed the introductory psychology initiative, which suggests that initial courses within the psychology field emphasize research methods, because psychology is a science; integrative themes; and five “pillars” or major psychological subfields: biological, cognitive, developmental, social/personality psychology, and mental/physical health.

IPI: Define and explain basic psychological concepts.

A Brief History of Psychology in Europe and the U.S.

Many people consider Wilhelm Wundt, a physiologist, to be the “founder” of psychology. In 1874, Wundt wrote a textbook called *Principles of Physiological Psychology*. In it, he argued that psychology should be a separate field of study, using scientific experiments to understand thoughts and behaviors. In addition, he started the first scientific lab devoted to human sensation and perception in Germany in the late 1800s. Other important people in the history of psychology include Edward Titchener, who founded structuralism in collaboration with Wundt; William James, the founder of functionalism; Ivan Pavlov, an early proponent of the biological approach to psychology; Sigmund Freud, the founder of the psychodynamic approach; John Watson, an early behaviorist; Kurt Lewin, an advocate for the sociocultural approach to psychology; Carl Rogers, who preferred the humanistic approach to the field; and Daniel Kahneman, who was an early cognitive psychologist.

IPI: Psychological science relies on empirical evidence and adapts as new data develop.

The Beauty of Diversity

Most of the “founding fathers” of psychology were White men. Psychology has a history of systemic prejudice in the areas of racism and sexism, which the APA has acknowledged and is trying to reconcile by including more diverse voices in the field. Examples of some of these pioneers, who have been helping to advance diversity in psychology, are Yūjirō Motora, Mary Whiton Calkins, Mamie Phipps Clark and Kenneth Clark, Robert Lee

Williams II, Martha Bernal, Mahzarin Banaji, Laura King, and Alette Coble-Temple. Their work is very briefly summarized in this section.

Instructions and Grading Rubrics for Instructor Usage

DISCUSSION QUESTION INSTRUCTIONS AND GRADING RUBRICS

To the Instructor: These discussion topics are designed to engage students in conversation about the content of the current chapter. The discussions may take place in a classroom or on the online platform of the course. The scenario is designed to offer structure to the discussion, so that students may focus on their understanding of the links between the major topics in the chapter. Students are encouraged to engage and share anything they think may be important, even if it may need to be corrected for accuracy. In the classroom, you may wish to divide students into breakout groups and let them discuss the topic before bringing them all together into a discussion as a larger group. Alternatively, you may assign the discussion activity before class so that students come to class prepared to discuss. On the online platform, students should comment on the main thread and reply to at least two other posts. Should you decide to make this part of the grade, a simple and flexible grading rubric has been provided for you at the bottom, and half points are possible to assign where you see fit.

Rubrics for Online Discussion

The main post and response will each be worth up to 5 points as per rubric below. Instructor should provide feedback to students on how to revise and repost so as to improve the quality of the submission. Each discussion activity is out of 10.

ESSAY AND RESEARCH PAPER INSTRUCTIONS AND GRADING RUBRICS

Research Paper Instructions

To the Instructor: The provided activities have been designed to allow for students to explore some research topics they will likely find interesting. Students will conduct comprehensive literature searches and write a research paper on the current state of the question. The purpose of this writing assessment is for students to show that they are able to find proper peer-reviewed papers and disseminate the findings in a coherent manner in APA format. The process has been divided into three parts to help students break down the tasks, stay motivated and not feel overwhelmed. In grading this assignment, it is suggested that you conduct two checkpoints for students. At Checkpoint #1, students should show you at least seven relevant peer-reviewed journal articles. At Checkpoint #2, they should show you an outline of the assignment, which will include any subheadings they plan to use and a summary of the content of each section. These checkpoints will provide an opportunity for students to flesh out their ideas and receive feedback with suggestions for improvement. They will also minimize last-minute assignments. A simple, adjustable rubric has been provided below, and the checkpoints are worth 40% in the process.
