3	Removing the meal try and leaving the room is uncaring and insulting to the patient.
4	The nurse should try to find out what is bothering the patient and ask specific questions. Remember that the patient has a very serious and probably terminal diagnosis, and anger is understandable. There is a reason for every behavior, and the nurse has the responsibility to learn the reason before reacting.
