Chapter 1: Philosophy, Science, and Nursing

1. **A.** Characteristics of a profession include defined and specialized knowledge base; control and authority over training and education; credentialing system or registration to ensure competence; altruistic service to society; a code of ethics; formal training within institutions of higher education; lengthy socialization to the profession; and autonomy (control of professional activities). Occupying a profession does not guarantee access to high pay. While professionals can become entrepreneurs, espousing all of the characteristics associated with being a professional is not required to start a business. As professionals, nurses have the autonomy to control their own professional activities.

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2. **C.** There is a three-tier system for entry into practice for the registered nurse; the three types of college degrees are diploma, associate degree, and bachelor's degree.

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3. **A, B, C.** Nursing philosophy refers to the belief system of the profession and provides perspectives for practice, scholarship, and research. The purpose of human life, nature of being, and theory of knowledge would all be included in the philosophy of nursing. Scientific method is part of the scientific approach to understanding. Science is concerned with causality, which is demonstrated by cause-and-effect relationships seen within and between phenomena of interest; philosophy is more concerned with the nonobservable than the scientific, measurable parts.

4. **A.** The received view values observation, perception by senses, and experience as sources of knowledge and includes empiricism, positivism, and logical positivism. Human science, phenomenology, and constructivism are all included in the perceived view.

5. **B.** Approaches to knowledge development have three facets: ontology, epistemology, and methodology. Ontology refers to the study of being: what is or what exists. Epistemology refers to the study of knowledge or ways of knowing. Methodology is the means of acquiring knowledge. Philosophy, according to Teichman and Evans, is "a study of problems that are ultimate, abstract, and general. These problems are concerned with the nature of existence, knowledge, morality, reason, and human purpose."

6. **B.** Personal knowledge is a priori, or knowledge gained from a person's thought alone. Empirics is the scientific form of knowing, and empirical knowledge comes from observation, testing, and replication. Intuitive knowledge includes feelings and hunches; it is not based on guessing but relies on nonconscious pattern recognition and experience. Somatic knowledge is a knowing of the body in relation to physical movement and includes experiential use of muscles and balance to perform a physical task.

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7. **C.** Conceptual knowledge is abstracted and generalized beyond personal experience. It explicates patterns revealed in multiple client experiences, which occur in multiple situations, and articulates them as models or theories. Clinical knowledge refers to the individual nurse's personal knowledge. It results from using multiple ways of knowing while solving problems during client care. Empirical knowledge results from experimental, historical, or phenomenologic research and is used to justify actions and procedures in practice. Emancipatory knowing refers to a human's ability to critically examine the current status quo and to determine why it currently exists.

8. **A, C.** Nursing is considered a practice science and a human science. The discipline examines issues related to behavior, culture, biology, physiology, and other factors of the human experience and is therefore also considered a human science. Engineering, architecture, and pharmacology are examples of practice sciences.

- 11.**B.** Autonomy in nursing practice is incomplete because nurses still depend on healthcare providers to direct much of their practice, such as prescribing medicine. Having a defined and specialized knowledge base would be exemplified if the example were to include the nurse providing education to the client about pain management. Altruism exemplified in nursing practice refers to the concern for the welfare and well-being of others that is outlined in nursing competencies and the code of ethics governing nursing practice. Use of a credentialing system refers to the requirement that all nurses require a certain type and quality of education along with specific certifications to perform practice responsibilities.

- 13.**A.** Postpositivists accept the subjective nature of inquiry but still support rigor and objective study through quantitative research methods. Indeed, it has been observed that modern empiricists or postpositivists are concerned with explanation and prediction of complex phenomena, recognizing contextual variables. Like empiricism, positivism supports mechanistic, reductionist principles, where the complex can be best understood in terms of its basic components. Phenomenology is the study of phenomena and emphasizes the appearance of things as opposed to the things themselves. In postmodernism, knowledge is viewed as uncertain, contextual, and relative.

- 14.**C.** Somatic knowledge is a knowing of the body in relation to physical movement. It includes experiential use of muscles and balance to perform a physical task. Personal knowledge, or a priori knowledge, pertains to knowledge gained from thought alone. Esthetics, which is knowledge related to beauty, harmony, and expression, incorporates art, creativity, and values. Intuitive knowledge, which includes feelings and hunches, is not guessing but relies on nonconscious pattern recognition and experience.

- 15.**B.** Phenomenology is the study of phenomena and emphasizes the appearance of things as opposed to the things themselves. In phenomenology, understanding is the goal of science, with the objective of recognizing the connection between one's experience, values, and perspective. It maintains that each individual's experience is unique, and there are many interpretations of reality. Inquiry begins with individuals and their experiences with phenomena. Perceptions, feelings, values, and the meanings that have come to be attached to things and events are the focus. Positivism, logical positivism, and empiricism are philosophical perspectives that are grounded in the received view and purport that theories are either true or false, subject to empirical observation, and capable of being reduced to existing scientific theories.
