ANS: Most of the research done by researchers in the areas of natural or physical sciences doesn't lend itself to political or social beliefs. Astronomy, geology or oceanology are studies of physical items. Social scientists are usually concerned about problems that affect humans thus they are more likely to have opinions, which can color their conclusions.

1. Discuss the analogy of whether noise is made by a tree falling in the uninhabited forest and the social constructionism belief that a social problem is not really a problem unless it is perceived by large numbers of people to be a social problem.

ANS: Problems do exist before large numbers of people recognize them as such. For example, violence against women has always occurred in history and in most civilizations but it was only recently that large numbers of people and policy makers agreed that policy measures should be enacted to curb and punish these abuses. But, obviously, to the women who experienced these abuses before they were widely recognized, it was a serious problem even if it was not generally agreed that it was a social problem.

2. Discuss the natural history of social problems by explaining their four stages.

ANS: The first stage is the emergence or claims making stage where a social entity begins to call attention to a particular type of behavior. Many times, the social entity tries to get the attention of elected officials or media representatives. The second stage is known as the legitimacy stage because the problem has been accepted as real and needing attention. Next, the social change groups renew their claims making and request more changes to resolve the problem. Finally, the last stage is the development of alternative strategies to solve the situation due to a less than adequate response from the government.

ANS: In our bodies, any sudden, rapid change is a sign of danger to our health. If we break a bone in one of our legs, we have trouble walking; if we lose sight in both our eyes, we can no longer see. Slow changes, such as the growth of our hair and our nails, are fine and even normal, but sudden changes like those just described are obviously troublesome.

ANS: Conservatives would be more likely to be Functionalists since this theory believes in a strong society with only incremental change. Social stability is brought about by strong support for institutions such as religion and the family. On the other hand, liberals are more concerned about the inequities in society and believe that sudden and dramatic change is necessary and required at times. Thus, they are probably more likely to support conflict theory.

ANS: Through the use of pressure or interest groups, social problems have been identified such as discrimination against women and minorities and brought to the attention of policy makers. As a result, many laws on both the state and federal levels of government have been passed which has made these actions illegal and punishable. For example, women were not allowed into many professions and colleges until this social problem became widely known.

6. Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of the major methods of conducting research on social problems.

ANS: Surveys are excellent instruments if large numbers of people need to be included and generalizations can be made from the data. However, the downside of surveys is that they can be expensive and time consuming. Experiments, if done correctly, can produce convincing data regarding cause and effect but due to the limited number of participants it will be unlikely that generalizations will be valid. Research by observation, also known as field research, can provide excellent detailed information on the participants but again, the results cannot be used to make generalizations. Using existing data such as U.S. Census data is inexpensive, and the data is readily available but there may not be a match with the hypothesis of the research and the data may not be recent.

ANS: College students are normally of higher income and younger than the population at large so that any research with their participation will usually be skewed in that direction. This makes the research and the resulting data less useful to the community at large and therefore its usefulness is also dubious. However, if the purpose of the research is to make generalizations about this particular segment of the population, then the research can be of more interest and value.

8. Discuss the importance of using the scientific method.

ANS: The scientific method requires the researcher to adopt an objective perspective to the research. By starting with a hypothesis or a question to be answered, the researcher is required to gather the data required to answer the question and let the results speak for themselves. This is essential in social research since to do otherwise leads to distrust and disbelief by the audience. Frequently, the purpose of social research is to discover causes of a social problem and to recommend changes and/or improvement. Being objective and fully disclosing the data accumulated is essential to bringing about the change that may be recommended from the research.
